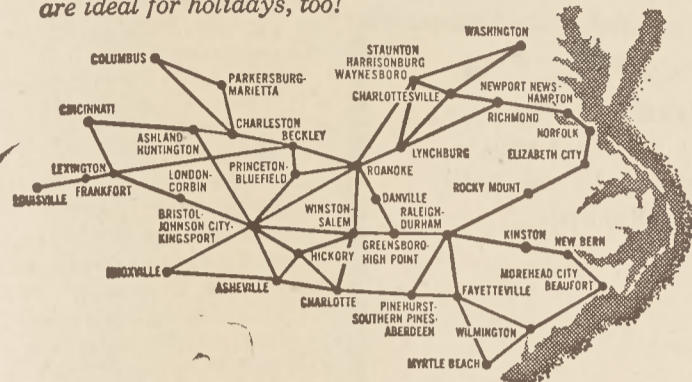


Notes such as this are seen in colleges and prep-schools all across the top of the South. "Home for the weekend" is economical and quick on **PIEDMONT**.

Dr. Denton, head of the economics department, has been a quiet, stabilizing force around the campus of Salem College. Dr. Denton came to Salem from the University of North Carolina where he earned his Masters and Ph.D. degrees and taught in the social science department. He did his undergraduate work at Oklahoma State University.

A native of Sulpher, Oklahoma, Dr. Denton has held such various positions as florist's assistant, combination bell hop-night clerk in a resort hotel, and a cowhand before beginning his formal studies. As a pastime, he enjoys tinkering with automobiles, having once been an auto mechanic.

A major portion of his time is devoted to his wife and small children, Mary Leigh, three years old, and Alfred Davis, five months. He assists in the leadership training program of Centenary Methodist Church. The rest of his "spare" time is spent in background reading and digging up new and stimulating ideas to present to his students, especially those in his advanced classes. His pet project is a research study on population migration, especially in the light of its relationship to education. He hopes to intensify his study after leaving Salem.
