Facts on Rape

Rape - it's a terrifying thought. So lots of women don't think about it. But there are some things you ought to know.

- Rape happens to women of all ages, from all walks of life.

- It's planned! Rapes aren't the result of "uncontrolled passion."

- The rapist isn't after sex. Most have normal sexual relations available to them. Instead, the rapist uses sex as a violent way to express his anger.

Chances are you'll never have to learn about rape firsthand. To make those chances even less likely, keep these tips in mind:

- Most people think that rapes occur only in dark alleys ... but about one-third

occur in the victim's own home. So practice good home security. And don't let that stranger or repairman into your place without making sure that he is who he says he is.

- When you're outside, there are places where rapists may hide - poorly lighted streets, doorways, or even in passing cars. Stay away from them. If you can, go out with a friend.

- Some people forget that crime can happen in their cars, too. That's where many rapes are committed. Check your car before you get in, and lock the doors when you drive. Most important - don't pick up strangers or get into a stranger's car yourself.

His firm restored the Single Brothers House and moved the Salem library to make room for the Shober House.

The original 1837 wing of Brookstown Mill now includes office space and a large area for parties and receptions. The 1881 wing contains 18 new shops.

Browsers will discover needlework, handmade Christmas ornaments, antiques, Boehm porcelain, oriental arts and crafts, ladies' fashions, cowboy boots, fresh flowers, books, photography displays, gifts for unicorn lovers, sketches and paintings.

For chocolate lovers, there is Brookstown Fudge, and for coffee lovers, the Coffee Mill.

Spaces are waiting for the Cookie Crunch whose cookies will be baked on the premises and the mill's second restaurant, J.J. Linsey's Deli and Pub. A gourmet shop opening in the spring will offer cooking lessons given by the chef of the Salem Cotton Company.

The Village Smith Gallery and the Tour de Graphiques, both at the entrance of the 1881 wing, have the same owners. Stormy Smith and her husband display American and European art posters in Tour de

Graphiques and feature regional and national artists in shows at the Village Smith Gallery. Future shows include the works of Ward Nichols, Stephen Sebastian, and Erte, a famous designer in fashion and theater. An exhibit in the gallery on August 28 featured the watercolors of Melanie Godwin, a 1971 graduate of Salem.

The Brookstown Mill has become popular with both tourists and local people. As Abe D. Jones, Jr. of the Greensboro News and Record said, "It's a far cry from the days when a homesick farm girl sat in the loft after a long day in the mill and drew a pretty lady's face on the wall."

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
