

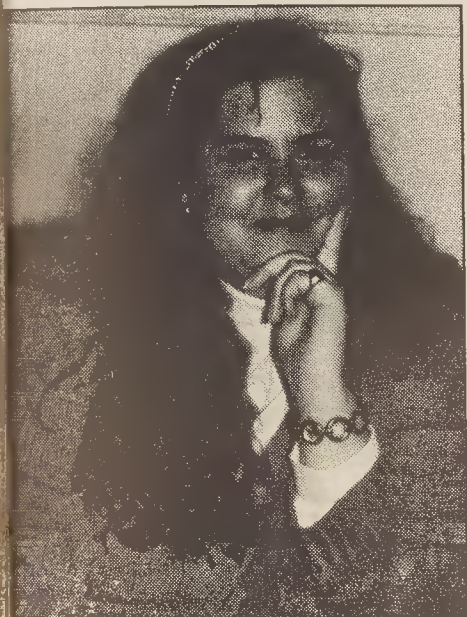
New Executive Board Shares Positive Outlook

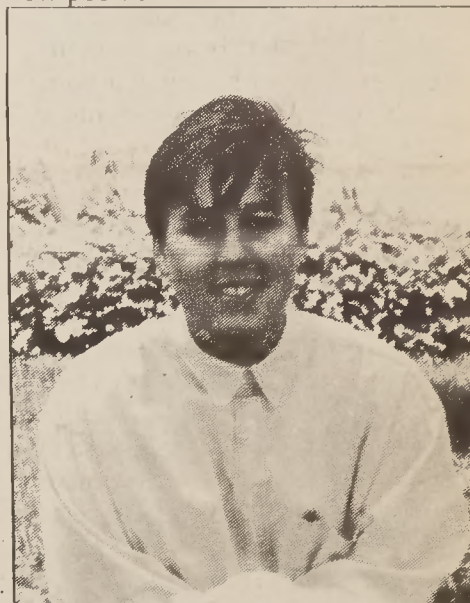
"I am excited about the changes that have been made so far especially the new general fund. It is there to benefit the students and I hope they will take advantage of this new privledge."

said Debbie Bruce of her new position as Honor Council chair. Bruce said she is looking forward to a good year and to doing the best that she can with her new position.



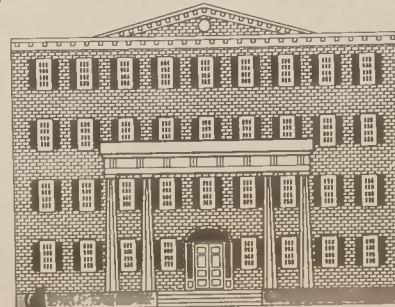
Murray
