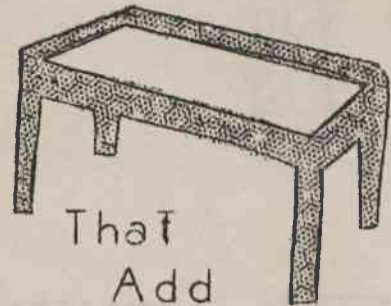
JANIE GLOVER, '43,
