Future Farmers Practice Leadership, Character Glover Produces Hybrid Seed

Spurring the agriculture students to learn new and old methods of doing farm jobs and the results of different practices followed on the farm is the motto of the Future Farmer organization:

"Learning to do; doing to learn. Learning to live; living to serve."

Their farm practice programs or projects on the home farm give the ag. boys an opportunity to put into practice some of the things learned.

In this connection, adviser Leamon Tapp points out: "Individuals do not learn things by merely

studying about them. For we have not learned a thing until it has been made a part of us. It follows, then, that some doing is necessary before learning is achieved.

"Home practices are the things that make it possible for the boy to learn. Doing should result in some earning, because the satisfaction from earning is an incentive for putting forth more effort and using improved methods of farming.

"The greatest achievement of man is the service he renders; therefore the living of a life to the fullest extent requires the performing of the four things in the FFA motto."

For part of his last year's farm practice program Keith Glover produced approximately 66 bushels of T23 hybrid seed corn on one acre.

By alternating two rows of hybrid with one row of Jarvis golden prolific corn and planting the outside rows in the field with Jarvis he received the proper pollination for his hybrid cross.

After detassiling and pulling the corn, Keith dried and treated it to prevent loss from rot or insects.

FFA AND F.H.A. PLAN FOR ANNUAL BANQUET

By holding eliminations now, the ag. boys are selecting the winner who will represent the Bailey chapter at Red Oak on December 16 in the Lecture Demonstration Contest.

Three delegates, one of whom will give the demonstration, the ag. teacher, and the principal from each school in the federation will attend the meeting. The winner will receive a banner for the chapter he represents.

The demonstrations that the boys decided to give consisted of sharpening chisels, judging beef cattle, tying knots, applying cyanimid and uramon on tobacco beds, soldering, using the framing square, applying first-aid, sharpening jack planes, and caring for home orchards.

Keith Glover is now leading in the chapter contest.
