Since our staff hasn't yet run across this information, we believe the students would like to know these facts. The article is taken from the FRE-NO-CA HIGHLIGHTS, Fremont.N.C.

It costs the state of North Carolina an average of \$4.28 a day to operate a school bus. This \$4.28 does not include any depreciation on equipment; it is purely the operation and maintenance cost. One dollar of this sum goes to the driver, nearly a dollar to the mechanic, and almost a dollar for gas. oil, and grease. The remaining \$1.28 is prorated among such items as repair parts, tires and tubes, garage equipment, etc.

The annual cost for transporting each child to and from school in North Carolina is approximately \$15. No state has a better safety record nor a more economical rate than our state.
