March meeting of the PTA forward one week, so that all teachers may be present for Open House, the president has announced.

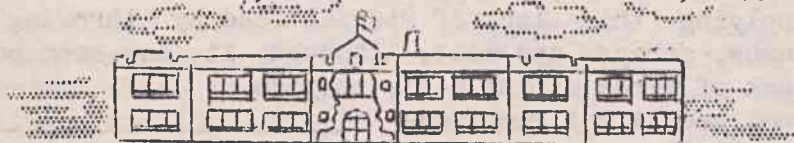

Extra Funds Enable School To Add Books

County Institutes New Grading Rule

Nash County has set up a new grading system that will spur students to do "progressively better" during the year or fail.

Principal M. W. Weaver called the high school to the auditorium after mid-term to explain the new county ruling regarding passing grades.

RULING

Weaver reported the county office has issued the statement that a failing grade during the fall term may be pulled up by a passing grade during the spring term.

On the other hand the new ruling does not permit a passing fall term grade to pull up a failing spring term grade.

The reason stated for this restriction is that such a grade shows the student is going backward rather than making the required progress.

Accumulation of \$347.41 from high school book fees over the years between the adoption of new textbooks has enabled Bailey School to purchase books needed in the different departments and the library, C. H. Fries, Assistant County Superintendent, informed the school this month.

After each department had placed its order-

it was discovered that there remained \$120.60 for Miss Idalia Oglesby, librarian, to use in purchasing library books.

ADDS DICTIONARIES

The English department divided its funds between providing dictionaries sufficient for most every pupil in the English classes to have a Thorndike Barnhart High School Dictionary at his command, and in increasing the number of remedial readers needed to help improve the reading
