## Sportsmanship Award Goes To Bud Davis

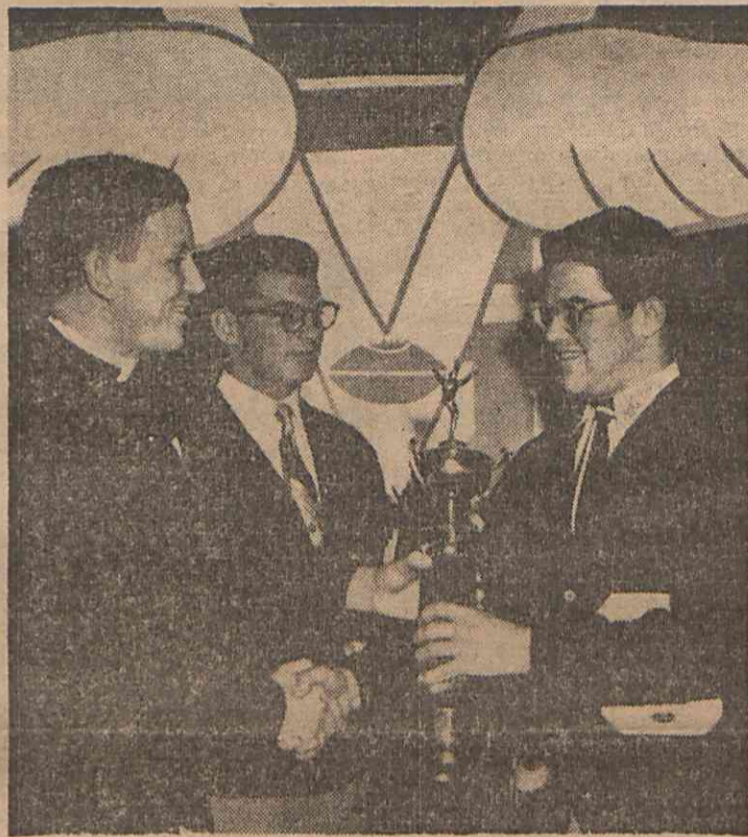
Bud Davis, tackle on the 1949 Goldsboro High School football team, was named Wednesday as the thirteenth winner of the Paramount Theater Sportsmanship award. He was chosen on a secret ballot by his team mates.

Davis is a veteran of two year's action with the Varsity and is planning to return to school next year. Besides football, he is manager of the Varsity basketball team and played with the Junior basketball squad before becoming Varsity manager.

The award has been presented since 1937 by the Paramount Theater to the boy adjudged by his teammates to have shown the greatest degree of sportsmanship during the preceding season.

The award was presented to Davis by Reverend George Stierwald, rector of St. Stephens Episcopal church in Goldsboro.

The second annual Loyal Order of the Moose award given to the Most Valuable Man on the football squad, was awarded Wednesday to W. D. McRoy, Jr., who won the trophy for the second time. He was presented the award by Reverend George Stierwald, rector of St. Stephens Episcopal church.

McRoy, who also won the handsome trophy last year when it was first presented, is a veteran of three year's action on the Varsity and is adjudged by many as one of the better ball players the Earthquakes have had in many years.

This year, McRoy was named on several All-Eastern teams and played in the Shrine Bowl as a member of the North Carolina squad. During the regular season, McRoy was the offensive and defensive leader of the team and led in scoring and average yards rushing. He weighs 180 pounds and is 18 years old.

Mr. Miller duplicated his success with the current Broadway hit "The Death of a Salesman." "All My Sons" was presented Friday evening, December 9 and played through Saturday evening, December 10 with curtain time at eight fifteen.

The play was concerned with the fortunes of the Keller and Deever families. During the war Joe Keller and Herbert Deever ran a machine shop which made airplane parts. Deever was sent to prison because the firm turned out defective parts, causing deaths of many men. Keller went free and made a lot of money. The twin shadows of this catastrophe and the fact that the young Keller son was reported missing during the war dominate the action. The love affair of Chris Keller and Ann Deever returned from war to find his bitterness of George Deever his father's partner free, are all set in a structure of almost unbearable power. The production was under the direction of Clifton Britton, who gives the play the impact and electrifying intensity of the New York production.
