Junior McRoy—At last!

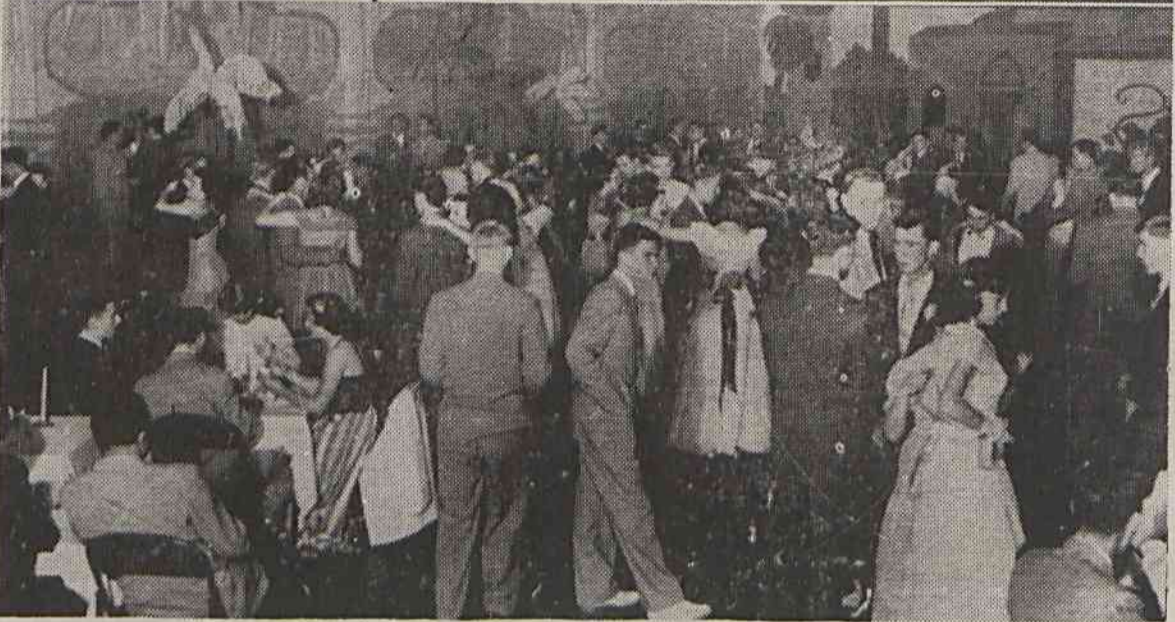
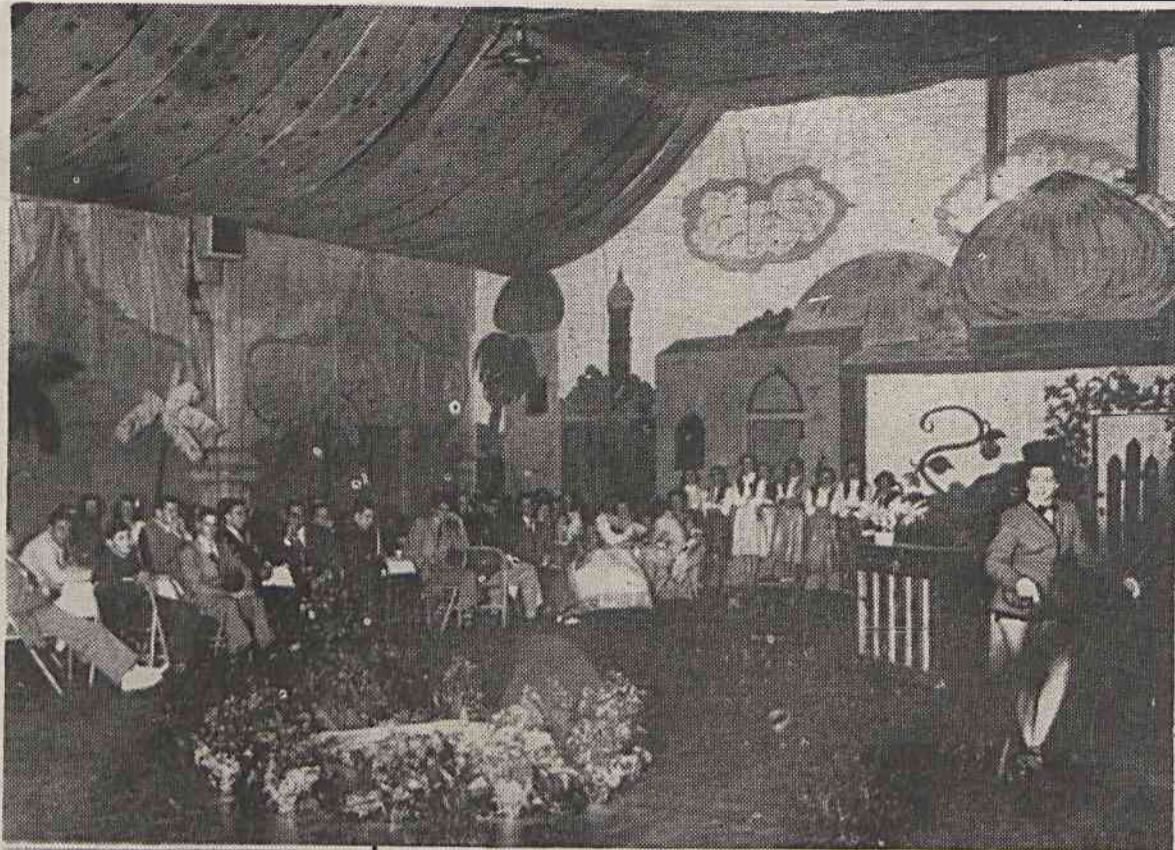
Peggy Britt—It's a lie and I know it.
