Driver Ed. Proves Interesting Class To RM Students

Students of both Senior High and Junior High, providing they are eligible, are now offered driver education, a course that proves to be interesting, fun, and rewarding.

To be eligible a student must be at least 14 years and 6 months of age. After completing both courses, a student obtains a certificate that will enable him to receive a discount on his insurance, granted by most insurance companies.

Fifty-one Senior High students have requested the classroom phase, available during this semester. This course, taught by Coach Don Hipps, meets at fifth period in room 213. He plans to teach a different class, of only driver education, each six weeks.

Driver education is also taught as a behind-the-wheel phase. This is taught during the summer. Each class will last an hour, and will require that six hours be spent in actual driving.

Sixty-one Senior High students, and a vast number from Junior High, have requested the course be taught this summer. This course will be taught by Coach Hipps and Coach Chris Carpenter. The first 15 days will require two hours in class and one behind the wheel. An hour will be spent in class during the remaining three days.

Schedules for these classes are Monday through Saturday; the first course beginning June 1 — June 20. The other courses are June 22 — July 11, and July 13 — August 11. All students who are interested are urged to talk with their parents and teachers.

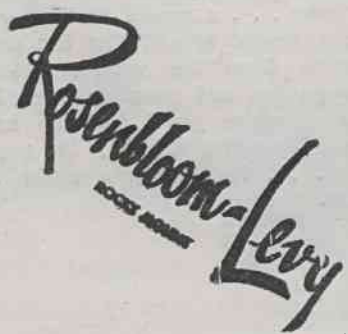
