# 850 Senior High Students Served By Cafeteria Workers Each Day

(Editor's Note. Under the man-agement of Mrs. Doris Hack-ney, a staff of seven serve over 850 students per day in the Senior High Cafeteria. We offer this article not only that you may learn more about the food system here but also to recognize and honor those who prepare and serve lunch for the student body).

Reporting to work at 8:00 each school morning seven women begin cooking and preparing food for the largest student body in Rocky Mount.

Mrs. Hackney, manager of the cafeteria, has been em-ployed here for seven years. She is ably assisted by Mrs. Susie Winstead, Mrs. Camilla Lucas, Mrs. Mary Jenkins, Mrs. Margie Arrington, Mrs. Flor-ence Smith, and Mrs. Brooks Daughtridge.

During the actual lunch hour, these women are aided by several students, Frank Waruszak, Moody Smith, Doug Knowies, Dusty Moore, and Kenneth Rackey. These boys operate the snack bar in the rear of the cafeteria and oc-casionally help with the main lines.

Mrs. Bessie Carr is cashier both lunch periods, assisted by Tom McAuley first lunch pe-riod and Faye Downing second period. Mrs. Hackney and Grady Howell fill in for these on occasions.

Mrs. Ailene Howard, Walter Howard, and James Walker handle the dish machine in the kitchen and also clean the cafeteria every afternoon.

### MENU

A variety of food is served in the cafeteria to over 850 students per day, with an average of 300-450 plate lunches being purchased.

In addition to the plate lunches, the following items are sold daily: 480 hamburgers, 360 hot dogs, 900 cartons of milk, 225 packages of do-nuts,

270 slices of pie, 55 pimento cheese sandwiches, 55 ham salad sandwiches, 50 salads, and several boxes of a variety of ice cream. When these figures are multiplied by 180, you can see how much food is really served at Senior High in a year.

The following plate lunches will be offered this year: bar-becue (they make their own), spaghetti, meat balls, beef stew, meat loaf, franks, mac-aroni and cheese, ham, tuna salad, fish sticks, bologna, vienna sausage, turkey, and chicken. These meals will be served with two vegetables and a bread. Incidentally, the rolls which proved so popular last year will soon be sold

again.

### FUTURE PLANS

The cafeteria will adequately feed the students for several years and enlargement at the time is unnecessary, according to Mrs. Hackney.

Asked about the possibility of switching to the central kitchen lunches in the future, she replied, "I don't think that Senior High students would like the central kitchen meals. When students get to Senior High, they're not children any-more. They have minds of thier own."

Hats off to you, Mrs. Hack-ney, and your staff for your faithful work which will surely continue for many years!
