One of five finalists which were determined by the amount of money turned in, Lindy received the most votes from the student body. Other finalists and their escorts were Shelley Stallings with Steve Wright, Jackie Smith with Johnny Moring, Susan Klitzner with Mickey Bailey, and Mitzi Moore with Julian Fenner. Danny Talbott, escort of Miss Print, was hailed as Mr. Print.

### Students Compete For Elks Award

Six seniors of Rocky Mount Senior High have been chosen by Principal C. M. Edson to compete for the local Elks Leadership Award. Ginna Aldridge, Greg Low, Jan McCrary, Routh Oates, Dwight Thomas, and Skipper Tuttle will represent Senior High in the competition.

Candidates must complete a brochure about themselves. This brochure should contain a recent photograph of the nominee, a statement of less than 300 words by the nominee summarizing his activities and accomplishments, a letter from a parent or relative, two or three letters of endorsement from persons who have had an opportunity to observe the nominee, and newspaper clippings, photos, etc., that the nominee deems important. The official entry blank must also

be placed in the brochure.


Each Elks Lodge will select an outstanding boy and an outstanding girl upon a special rating formula. Leadership, which includes initiative, organizational ability and influence on others, will count 40 points. Twenty points will be awarded for citizenship appreciation. This includes "interest in and concern about our cherished privileges of citizenship and constituted government, and participation in community and Americanization programs", Perseverance, resourcefulness, and sense of honor also rate 20 points. These qualities are judged as "exemplified by their record in school, church, community, etc., especially in overcoming difficulties, includes integrity, sportsmanship, general character and reputation". Neatness and arrange-

ment of the brochure will count ten points and compliance with instructions will constitute the final ten points.

Winners in the local competition will receive a \$100 U. S. Savings Bond and the right to compete on the state level. Winners in state competition compete on the national level with the top award being a \$1000 U. S. Savings Bond.

Each of the students competing for the award from Senior High have exemplified their leadership in various ways. Ginna is Business Manager of the HINOC-AR, Greg is President of the Student Organization, Jan is Secretary of the Student Organization, Routh is Secretary of the Senior Class, Dwight is Editor of THE BLACKBIRD, and Skipper is President of the National Honor Society.
