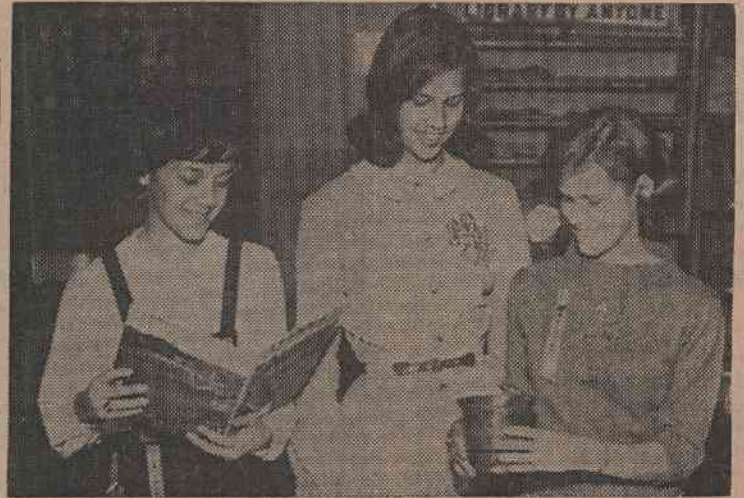
## Brenda Allen Takes Bunker Hill Election

Gay introduced Kathy Cherry and Beverly Rosser as AFS Americans Abroad candidates from RMHS for next summer. Kathy and Beverly had been

seated on stage and they both stood when introduced.

Ann Robertson, AFS Americans Abroad from RMSHS this past summer, spoke to the students about some of her most interesting experiences in Brazil. She then called Eddie Baysden, president of the Student Organization, to the rostrum and she presented a statue to the student body through him.
