Nominating Plans For S.O. Officers Given To School

Hey, how did she get to run for that office? Why didn't they choose me? If he can run I know I can.

These are some of the familiar sounds heard after the nominating committee announced the candidates for the offices of the S.R.A. Everyone probably wondered how and why the candidates were selected.

According to Article XI, Section 1 of the Constitution, the retiring president appoints students to a nominating committee. The president selects students at random, seeing that each of the three classes, sex, and race is represented.

Students are selected on the basis of their leadership, devotion and character. Since there are no set number of candidates for each office, the nominations are narrowed down by voting within the committee.

A member of the nominating committee, rising junior, or rising senior can be nominated for any office; therefore rising juniors (present sophomores) can be nominated for president of the S.R.A. If a student desires to petition for an office he or she must get an official petition blank from the Guidance Office and the signatures of at least 15% of the student body.

The Australian Ballot is used in elections. Members of the nominating committee count the ballots under the supervision of a faculty member from the Guidance Office.

Every student has an opportunity to register. Each year, for about one week the registration books are opened.
