Pictured in the May 13, 1952 issue are the RMSH track and baseball teams. The track team, bare-chested and short-haired, are shown arm-overarm in a "we got togetherness on this team" fashion. The diamondmen in the May 23, 1940 issue were showing off their skinned heads and baggy uniforms, typical of that era.

Leading Blackbird hitter was Budley Whitley, who after 10 games had a .480 batting average. Many students at RMSH remember Mr. Whitley more for being principle at Edwards Junior High,

In another of the 1952 issues, the Wilmington Wildcats put one on the Birds. Quoted from the issue:

"RMSH's Blackbird baseball team dropped their ninth game in ten starts to the Wilmington Wildcars in an Eastern AAA conference game last Thursday. Burt Grant, a right hander, pitched a five-hitter for the Cats. Sonny Jergenson knocked a 350 ft. home run along with a single to lead the hitting.

Jergenson, better known now as quarterback for the Washington Redskins, was then enjoying sporting game fame at Wilmington High School.

Well, that's the way it was way back then, and I hoped you've enjoyed reading RMSH history as much as I have enjoyed writing it.


