RMSH Drops Phys Ed Requirement

Physical Education, a course which the Rocky Mount School System now requires its students to take one semester of in the tenth and eleventh grades will not be required next year. Students are now required by state law to take physical education in the ninth grade.

The Rocky Mount School Board, in approving the change, noted that the course will still

be offered as an elective in the tenth, eleventh and twelfth grades. One of the major reasons the course will no longer be required is the general lack of participation and enthusiasm on the part of the students. This results in the refusal of many to dress out for class than resulting in a large number of failures in a class required for graduation.
