Counselors Attend Sessions

ATTENTION College Bound students! There is no longer the need for you to waste your hard earned money by taking the SAT twice. Students are informed that after this year their scores from one test will be enough. They are told that there is usually so little change that to take the test twice couldn't help or harm the student that much; although present seniors who took the SAT last year are urged to retake it this year.

This information along with a lot of other important details was discussed at a workshop for guidance counselors, Wednesday, Oct. 9. Two local counselors, Mrs. Edythe Tweedy and Mrs. Kate Kichin attended this affair along with other counselors from Nash, Edgecombe and Pitt counties.

The meeting was held in the new Student Center. The guest speaker, Mr. Walter Jacobs from Atlanta, Ga., divided the meeting into three sessions.

The first of these sessions dealt with the SAT and Achievement Test with emphasis on the students filling out their applications and in-

terpretation of student reports.

Here are seven points to remember about the SAT:

1) Test scores, like all types of measurements are not perfectly precise and should not be treated as though they were.

2) Although test scores are good predictors of performance in college, they aren't perfect predictors.

3) Students do not have to earn very high scores to be admitted to college.

4) As useful as they are, test scores should never be used in isolation but should be considered along with the high school record.

5) Tests like the SAT and the Achievement Test measure certain characteristics basic to academic success in college, certainly not all.

6) The SAT score represents only a measure of ability.

7) SAT scores do not pretend to measure or predict "success in life."

This year for the first time there will be two sub scores for verbal score: 1) vocabulary 2) reading compensation.

Probably the most important information was in session two. This was about the College Scholarship Service, and

helping students and parents fill out the financial aid applications. The earlier colleges receive this information, the more likely a student is to get a loan, grant or scholarship.

The third session dealt with student decision making.

Mrs. Kitchin and Mrs. Tweedy remind students that the next SAT for which it is possible to apply is December 7, 1974. Regular registration deadline was October 24 and late registration deadline is November 7.
