## CPR Illustrated

Mr. Jake Arnold and Mrs. Rosalie Lynne demonstrated Cardiac Pulmonary Respiration to Mrs. Christine Tripp's biology class May 6.

Mr. Arnold is a volunteer first aid and CPR-instructor for the American Red Cross Association. Mrs. Lynne is the executive director of the Rocky Mount-Nash County Chapter of the American Red Cross.

A plastic dummy was used in the demonstration. Among the procedures discussed were where to strike the chest to

begin CPR, the number of times the chest should be mashed to exhale air, and the number of times the person giving CPR should breathe into the victim's mouth.

Mr. Arnold told the students that the victim could be administered CPR within the first minutes with little danger of brain damage. "One should never try and administer CPR without the proper knowledge," said Mr. Arnold. "CPR can be harmful as well as good."

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
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
