Jack Floyd drew a historical picture of George Washington behind the barn. This was followed by a round pig drawn by the same amateur artist.


Athur Moss then came out on the stage to pose for a picture. Jack Floyd again disp'ayed his skill by drawing a picture of Mr. Moss in his old age.
