Student Council Election Will Be Held May 13th

Installation Service To Be Held After Election

Election of Student Council officers for the year 1941-42 will be held on May 13, Mr. McFadyen announced several days ago.

Prior to the election, the week of May 5 to 9, a candidate must secure from the office a petition. He will have one hundred students sign it, designating that they wish him to be nominated. All petitions must be bona fide and any student signing more than one will cause such papers to be discarded. No student shall run for more than one office.

Besides being students in good standing, the officers shall be chosen from the following: president from the rising 10th grade, vice-president from the rising 10th grade, secretary from the rising 10th grade, treasurer from any of the above named classes.

On May 16 at a regular chapel program the new officers will be installed. At this time the Student Council will also report to the student body on the activities of this year.
