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
Look Out Germany, Here Comes Andrew

Andrew Wines, a tenth grader here at ASHS, will go to Germany this summer for a year to study as a foreign exchange student. He was nominated for application for the scholarship by the school honors committee. A congressional committee chose 5 applicants from the state to be interviewed. Andrew then went to Meredith College on February 22. He was first interviewed in a group with the others, and then interviewed individually. After the interview, two of the five were selected.

The exchange organization, Youth for The exchange organization, Youth for Understanding, will sponsor him in this all-expense paid trip. He will go to Washington, D.C. on July 21 for three days to speak with German ambassadors. Then he will fly to Germany. There he will stay at a boarding school or with a family for one month so that he can study the German language and culture. These classes will last 6 hours a day. Then he will attend a German high school. Here he will take English and German, as well as other courses. Special activities included will be a four-day political seminar, a visit to East Berlin, and a trip to Bonn, the capital of Germany.

Andrew is very optimistic about the trip. "Of course, I'll miss being here," he says, "but I'm sure it will be a great experience."




Brochures will be out soon with more information about this summer's classes.
