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
PARKING LOT TO BECOME VOCATIONAL COMPLEX


Students Will Not Be Allowed To Drive To School Next Year

Since our legislators are considering not allowing anyone to drive who does not have a diploma, the Albemarle City School Board feels that valuable space is being wasted by the upper parking lot.

During the summer months the student parking lot will be bulldozed in preparation for the construction of a new vocational complex. This complex will include a new woodworking shop, a horticulture center, and a graphics lab. Plans for this building are in the making and actual construction will begin Monday, June 12. The woodworking shop that now exists behind the school will become the drafting room. Drafting is a new course available to tenth, eleventh, and twelfth graders at AHS. The horticulture center will include a greenhouse so that Mr. Morgan can have his plants properly maintained. The graphics lab will include printing presses and state of the art computer equipment. From now on, the Crossroads and the Full Moon will be printed on our own campus. The lower parking lot will remain the same so that teachers have somewhere to park and so that buses can load and unload students there.

Even if legislation does not pass this proposal, the renovations will still take place. So look out, mothers, carpooling will be in again!

Morgan Moving To Central Office Job; Clark Named New Principal



Mr. W.K. Morgan will assume his new


responsibilities on July 1.
