DR. E. G. TOWNSEND GIVES UNUSUAL CHAPEL TALK

DEAN OF BAYLOR COLLEGE BRINGS GREETINGS AND MES- SAGES FROM TEXAS

"The education of women is constantly developing and increasing," asserted Dr. E. G. Townsend, Dean of Baylor College of Texas, who conducted the devotional exercises in chapel Thursday morning, October 25. He continued to show that the problem at first to be confronted in the building of women's colleges was whether or not they would exist. The theory advanced was that there were few who would care for it and those who did might attend co-educational colleges. The speaker contrasted the condition with the present view taken of colleges for women in that the interest in education of women is increasing and that out of fifteen colleges for women the capacity of all except one is now crowded to the limit; taking, for instance, Baylor College, whose number have increased from 800 at the beginning to about 1,300 at the present time.

Dr. Townsend then pointed out that not only was there an increase in women's colleges in numbers attending but also in every other way. There is a great improvement in the quality of the students. Not as many demerits have to be given as formerly. There is less regard for the masculine element in that it is not needed as much now. The speaker in this connection made the statement that he had never seen a flapper although he had often heard of them. He said that that type of girl does not exist in colleges. He further pointed out that girls in colleges now are also more healthful, more sensible, far better looking, and more purposeful.

The speaker pointed out two important phases in the life of a girl which should be taken care of while they are securing their college training. The first point made was that by far the greatest per cent of those in the audi-
