INTERESTING CHAPEL TALK BY RETURNED MISSIONARY

MR. POWELL PUTS BEFORE STU-DENTS THE RELIGIOUS CON-DITIONS IN AFRICA

Friday morning we were favored with a very inspiring talk by Mr. Powell, one of our returned missionaries, on the trying religious conditions in Africa. Mohammedanism, he says, is spread throughout Africa, and the number of followers of Mohammed cannot even be estimated. This widespread Mohammedan religion is not the only great source of disturbance to the government and to the missionaries, for there is yet another, the followers of Islem. To these even the Christians are often forced to pay tribute. The most horrible factor conceivable is that they offer human sacrifice. Mr. Powell told of an instance when a Christian in the company of four other Christians watched these followers burn a house in which were his sister and her child while he was powerless to rescue them or to obtain help.

His talk imprinted more deeply in our minds the profound blessing of being citizens of the United States. It should make everyone realize more than ever in what a great country we live. We should realize too that othrs deserve a peaceful country in which to live, and that it is our duty and privilege to carry them the light that provides peace.
