REV. SULLIVAN SPEAKS IN CHAPEL SERVICE

WILMINGTON PASTOR ADDRESSES FACULTY AND STUDENT BODY

On October 17, Meredith students and faculty had the privilege of hearing Rev. J. A. Sullivan, pastor of Calvary Baptist Church, Wilmington, N. C., conduct the chapel devotionals. One cannot spend much time in Wilmington without realizing that Mr. Sullivan is not only pastor of Calvary Baptist Church, but of all Wilmington, for he is ever present when a comforter or worker is needed and he is known and loved by all.

Mr. Sullivan read the 19th Psalm, after which he made a prayer. The subject of his talk was Comradeship, a theme which appeals especially to college students. We were made to realize that going away to college means a severing of home ties for a while which is hard for the ones left as well as for those leaving. Mr. Sullivan spoke of the letters which a girl preparing to enter Meredith receives in the summer from old Meredith girls and how the interest of that girl is quickened and the heart is gladdened.
