DR. SHOREY GIVES SERIES OF LECTURES

NOTED SCHOLAR OF GREEK AND LATIN

LECTURES INTERESTING

Dr. Paul Shorey, professor of Greek at the University of Chicago, lectured at Meredith College November 22 and 23. In his first lecture on "The Girl Proposition in Antiquity," he traced the attitude towards women in Greek literature, giving special attention to Homer, Sappho, Euripides, and Austophanes. He showed that the popular notion that Greek women were kept in subjection and had little or no social and intellectual companionship with men, is opposed by much in the writings of the Greeks themselves. Dr. Shorey's witty and original translations and his skillful modernizations of passages in Greek literature especially pleased his audience.

Dr. Snorey's second lecture was on "Homer and What They Say of Homer." He emphasized the point that Homer is not merely a field for those interested in anthropology or philology. but that above all, it is poetry and, although it is simple, real poetry, not rude and primitive but highly finished and artistic. To prove his point, he showed that Homeric passages which are given as examples of a savage and DR. MADDRY GIVES OPPORTUNITY barbarian age may be parelleled by very similar passages from modern writers. The important thing to do in studying Homer is to enjoy him as a great poet.
