The purpose of this department is to unify the Meredith classes at Pullen, Tabernacle and First Baptist Churches and encourage their work.

> The first thing that the Sunday school department has attempted to do since its organization is to establish the six point record system of keeping the class records. This system is necessary in order to have standard Sunday school classes. It has been tested in hundreds of Sunday schools and found to be the quickest and most efficient method of keeping class records.

> There are two other reasons for having the six point record system besides the one mentioned above. The first is to train girls for work in their home Sunday Schools. All the progressive Baptist Sunday Schools of today are adopting this system, and the members of the North Carolina Baptist Sunday School board are anxious that the college students introduce this system into their home churches.

> The second reason is to create a spirit of rivalry among the classes. The record of each class is to be posted on the bulletin board every Tuesday so that each class can see what the other classes are doing. It has been voted by the classes to try the six point record system for three months, and since it has been such a success at other colleges, it is sure to be a success at Meredith.
