ing Pullen Memorial Church, Raleigh, with a return of \$10,516. Dr. Cullom reported fairly large returns from the student body of W. F. College, the total up to date reaching approximately \$1,111. The W. F. faculty thus far have reported \$4,000 plus.

At the report meeting on Friday night, the Senior Class of Meredith College reported approximately \$4,500 pledged. The canvass is still being made among members of that class.

well;

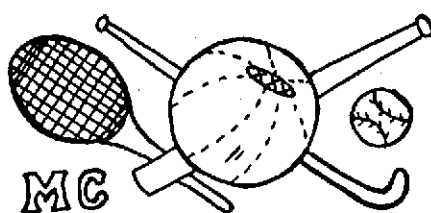
For her no owner's raptures swell;
