But the Judge advises them not to contest the will, so they submit to their fate.

The part of Jane was played exceedingly well by Martha Medlin, who has the ability to enter into her character and make of it a living person.

Annie Ree McGougan, in the role of Ben, the wild young hero, fought well the battle between right and wrong, aided only by Jane whose sympathy brought the audience into a deeper sympathy with the poor outcast, Ben.

Madeline Moore as Henry Jordan, the oldest son, is always anxious to have a note endorsed. Louise Sullivan, as Henry's wife Emma, ridiculed the Jordans when they failed to get the money. Mary Williams as Nettie, Emma Jordan's daughter by a former marriage, is also anxious for a share in the Jordan money as if she were a Jordan.
