SERIOUSLY HURT

ACCIDENT AWAKES GIRLS AND FACULTY EARLY SUNDAY MORNING

Calmly sleeping girls were suddenly awakened last Sunday morning about 6:45 by a loud noise coming from the direction of the dining room. It was soon learned that an explosion of a gas stove in the kitchen had been the source of this disturbing crash.

Two of the cooks were alone in the kitchen preparing breakfast. The head cook, Tom Burrell, was getting ready to bake his bread while his companion, Douglas was making the coffee. As Tom was lighting the stove, it is presumed that either he did not have his match ready when he turned the gas on, or one match went out and he turned to strike another while the gas was still on. At any rate, by some means gas accumulated in the oven, got mixed with air, and caused a bad explosion, tearing the stove

She arrived there at 1 o'clock and was met by Mr. Santford Martin, chairman of Centennial Campaign of Pilot Mountain Association, and his co-worker, Mr. M. L. Jones. She was then escorted to the Blue Willow Inn for lunch.

At the First Baptist Church, Saturday afternoon, Miss Elliot spoke about twenty minutes before an audience of about two hundred women. In her speech she traced briefly the history of Meredith College, showed just why the campaign is so vital to the growth of Meredith, and gave a challenge to the women to carry out their part in the campaign. At the close of the meeting Dr. Jester showed Miss Elliot over the church after which she was invited to the social hour given by the women.

After leaving the church she went to Madison to have dinner with Miss Irene Money, a Meredith graduate. From here she went to spend the night as the first guest in the new parsonage. She took part in the dedication services of the new parsonage.
