He received his A.B. and A.M. from Vanderbilt University, his Ph.D. from Cornell University, and has been professor of English at Trinity College, Durham and at the University of N. C. Now he is back at his Alma Mater Vanderbilt University, and also lectures at Peabody College for teachers, Nashville. He is a member of Phi Beta Kappa, and Delta Kappa Epsilon. One year he was director of the National Council of English Teachers.

Dr. Mims is a great admirer of Sidney Lanier, and has written his life. Besides many books which he has written, he has contributed many articles on English subjects to the encyclopedias. Meredith girls are indeed fortunate to welcome into their midst such a distinguished man!
