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Loyal Friend of Meredith Will be Greatly Missed-Southern Baptist Leader

Dr. Livingston Johnson, editor of the Biblical Recorder and pioneer worker and leader in the State Baptist denomination for twenty-eight years, died at his home in Raleigh at four o'clock Sunday morning.

Although Dr. Johnson had ocen a sufferer from heart disease for many years, he was never a "quitter" at his post. Even to the very last he worked on the Biblical Recorder, and gave of his best to the people whom he came in contact with. He had been confined to his bed only a few days when his death came.

He had held practically every office possible of the Baptists of North Carolina, and it would be extremely difficult to decide or say in which office he excelled. Everything that Dr. Johnson attempted to do, he did and did it well. He was so modest in his achievement that he never stead apart. He was a leader and held a conspicuous position with the Baptists for twenty-eight years.

When Dr. Johnson was thirty-one years of age, he was ordained as a Baptist minister. He served as a pastor of the church in Rockingham first; then he went to Lumberton, and
