Returns for Third Time in Five Years

Returning for the third time since 1927, Dr. Bernard Chancellor Clausen of Syracuse, New York, will again address Meredith's graduating class. He made the address in 1927 and in 1930, and his use of the three song hits as "Texts" for his talk has left a very striking impression of Dr. Clausen.

He is pastor of the First Baptist Church in Syracuse and has been since July, 1920. He offers his resignation every year, presenting a complete report of the past year and a complete program of objectives for the next.

Dr. Clausen who was born in Traced Since 1900 Hoboken in 1892, is a graduate of Colgate University, where he Thirty-one years and more received his A.B. in 1915 and his M.A. in 1916; of Union Theological Seminary in 1918; and of Syracuse University where he received his D.D. in 1922. He was ordained as a Baptist minister in 1917 and was a Chaplain of the U.S. Navy from 1917-19 in anti-submarine
