

WHO'S WHO LISTS DR. BREWER AND DEAN BOOMHOUR

Raleigh News and Observer Runs Sketches of Lives of Prominent North Carolinians Honored in American Book.

The News and Observer has recently been printing sketches of prominent North Carolinians whose names have been included in Who's Who in America for the years 1938-1939. President Charles E. Brewer and Dean J. G. Boomhour are both given recognition in the latest edition of Who's Who in America. Dr. Brewer achieved this distinction through outstanding work in educational and religious fields, and Mr. Boomhour, through successes in educational fields.

Dr. Charles Edward Brewer, President of Meredith College, was born in Wake Forest, North Carolina, on July 12, 1866, the son of John Marchant and Ann Eliza (Wait) Brewer. He received his A.B. degree at Wake Forest College in 1885 and his M.A. the following year. The years 1887-1889 were spent in studying at Johns Hopkins, and in 1900 Cornell University conferred upon him a Ph.D. On October 28, 1891, he married Love Estelle Bell of Shawboro, Currituck County, North Carolina. They had four children—Joseph Bell (deceased), Ellen Dozier, Ann Eliza, and Charles Edward (deceased).

From 1889-1915 Dr. Brewer was professor of chemistry at Wake Forest College, where he also served as dean from 1912-1915. Ever since June 1, 1915, he has been President of Meredith College. Among the offices he has held are membership in Board of Town Commissioners at Wake Forest from 1910-1915, and membership in the Southern Association of Schools and Colleges. He served as a member of the Junior Order of United American Mechanics, and a trustee of the National Orphans' homes of the same in Tiffin, Ohio, and Lexington, North Carolina, from 1911—Continued on page 3.

MISS MARY DANIEL SPEAKS IN CHAPEL

Shares With Students Her Most Interesting Experience As a Christian

Miss Mary Nance Daniel of Nashville, Tenn., associate secretary of student work for the Southern Baptist Convention, made a chapel address October 4 entitled "My Most Interesting Experience as a Christian." This experience, shared by two Meredith College students, Barbara Behrman and Eddie Belle Leavell, occurred about a year ago in a large auditorium in Zurich, Switzerland. The program, "Christ, Our Life," was planned by 13 members of the Youth Board and was presented to an audience representing all countries of the world. The flags of all the nations were side by side, and the young people of the different countries conversed and were friendly in this meeting to learn more about Christ. The program opened with a silent prayer, which was followed by the hymn "All Hail the Power of Jesus' Name." German and English were supposed to be the languages of the conference, but Miss Daniel said that each person was singing lustily in his own native tongue. Each country's representative, 28 in all, gave a verse of scripture for the devotional. The devotional was followed by an address by Dr. Frank Leavell of the Southern Baptist Convention. The main idea of his address was that each person should return to his country with these four words imprinted on his heart, "My Maximum for Christ."

Survey of Wake Social Conditions To Be Made By Meredith College Students

The Meredith Sociology Club, meeting Tuesday night in the Astro Hall, announced a comprehensive series of programs to deal with conditions among the Negroes of Raleigh and Wake County. Specific assignments were announced for the programs which are in keeping with the opinion of the club members expressed last month to emphasize inter-racial relations and personality development in its discussions. Dorothy Hagler of Gastonia, president of the club, announced the four specific subjects of study and the committees that will be in charge of the work. The domestic servant problem in Raleigh and Wake County will be the first subject for consideration, with Jessie Currin of Oxford, as chairman, and Lucy Rogers of Wilmington and Frances Batchelor of Sharpsburg, serving with her on the committee. A study of the Negro churches and church programs in Wake will be presented by Nancy Brewer

of Wake Forest, assisted by Bruce Kitchen of Scotland Neck, Martha Britt of Lumberton, and Margaret Lee Liles of Shelby. Information about Negro suffrage in Wake County will be secured by Branda McLendon of Kenansville, aided by Bebe Dickenson of Kinston and Frances Price of Pine Level. Martha Rasberry of Farmville, will be responsible for a survey of the physiognomy of crime in and around Raleigh, and working with her on this project will be Evelyn Brock of Rocky Mount and Zuble Ingie of Statesville.

The club named Dorothy Hagler and Paula Karl as delegates to the inter-racial conference sponsored by the YMCA and YWCA of the University of North Carolina, to be held at Chapel Hill October 23. Meredith Sociology Club was adopted as the official name of the organization and a constitution was ratified. Featuring the program for the night was a clever skit on personality types entitled, "As Others See You." An imaginary drug store, with the parts of two drug clerks played by Jessie Currin of Oxford and Lucy Rogers of Wilmington, provided the background for the portrayal of ten different types of feminine personalities, with the club members asked to identify each actress according to the various types listed on programs distributed to the audience. Students appearing in the skit with the types they exemplified in their lines and actions were: Frances Batchelor of Sharpsburg, as the quiet, reserved type; Blanche Johnson of Canton, as the quiet but interesting type; Sarah Hudson of Knoxville, Tenn., as the flirt; Cora Burns of Goldsboro, as the flirt type; Dorothy Hagler of Gastonia, as the student with an inferiority complex; Alice Shelley of Tabor City, as the boisterous type; Hilda Earp of Selma, as the haughty type; Dorothy Crawford of Goldsboro, as the domineering student; Frances Summerlin of Mars Hill, as the athletic type; and Paula Karl of Akron, Ohio, as the average American girl. Miss Frances M. Bailey assisted the cast in rehearsing for the characterizations, and Miss Maude Clay Little, club sponsor, was also present.
