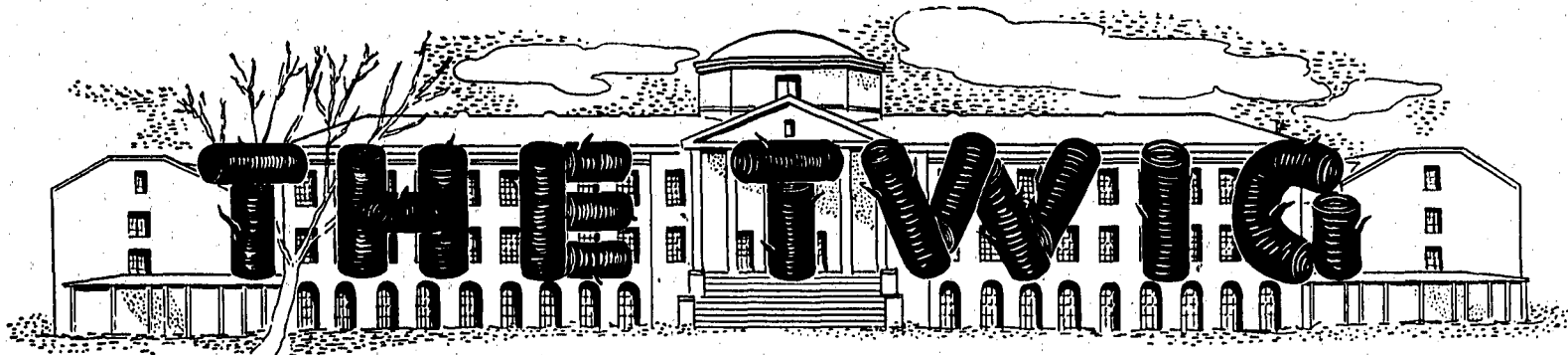

"Youth is a state of mind," stated Dr. John C. Glenn, pastor of Edenton Street Methodist Church, when he spoke in chapel on Thursday, November 2.
