Bracketing two of the screen's top favorites for the first time, "Lucky Partners" brings Ronald Colman and Ginger Rogers to the Ambassador Theatre in what is said to be the sprightliest comedy-romance of the season.

From the ultra-modern, sophisticated pen of Sacha Guitry, "Lucky Partners" casts Colman as David Grant, an artist with a secret past, and Miss Rogers as Jean, a clerk in her aunt's Greenwich Village book shop.

Jean is engaged to Poughkeepsie's coming tycoon, Freddie, and as soon as she earns a bank account for emergencies, she plans to marry him. Circumstances cause Jean to believe that David brings her good luck, and she urges him to join her in the purchase of a sweepstake ticket.

Agreed with the idea, David agrees, but on one condition: that Jean shall accompany him on a platonic honeymoon before she weds Freddie. Freddie, it seems, believes the nuptial journey is a waste of time and money, whereas David considers the event essential.

Jean consents, dubiously. However, they draw a horse, and Freddie secretly sells the ticket, which yields \$6,000. David considers the event essential. This falls on the first leg of their trip, hotly pursued by Freddie who has come to the conclusion that he doesn't trust David after all.

How David and Jean fall in love with one another without daring to reveal it, the complications caused by Freddie's arrival, and David's solution of the problem by running off and starting back to New York, only to be arrested on a charge of car theft, all lead up to the hilarious climax of the picture. A trial scene during which David's real identity and the secret of his odd behavior is revealed, and the satisfactory conclusion of the hectic romance, are featured in this fast-moving ending.

As the erratic and gallant David, Colman has his best screen role in years. Ginger's interpretation of Jean is delightful. Jack Carson has his best opportunity to date as the self-satisfied Freddie, while Spring Byington as the heroine's aunt, Harry Davenport as a judge and Celia Loftus and Brandon Tynan as an elderly married couple, enact the principal supporting roles.

"Lucky Partners" directed by Lewis Milestone, is a production by George Haight for RKO Radio, made from Allan Scott and John van Druten's screenplay of Sacha Guitry's original story.
