This year the association will present six concerts: Sergei Rachmaninoff, one of the greatest living pianists; Nauritz Melchoir and Lotte Lehmann, Metropolitan Opera stars in an especially arranged joint program; Gladys Swarthout, star of radio, concert, opera and screen; Nathan Milstein, one of the world's outstanding virtuosi; Luboslutz and Nemcnoff, and Lawrence Tibbett, called America's "own" baritone; and the National Symphony Orchestra with Hans Hindler as conductor, one of America's greatest orchestras.

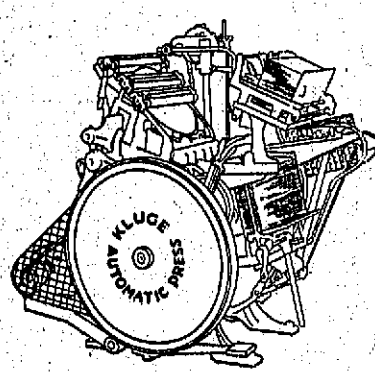
