

## History Society Meet In Raleigh

Association Meets Dec. 4 and 5; Mr. Agat Will Be Speaker

Mr. Herbert Agat, editor of the Louisville Courier-Journal and a widely known public speaker, will deliver the principal address at the annual meeting of the State Literary and Historical Association of North Carolina in Raleigh Thursday and Friday, December 4 and 5.

The Virginia Dare Ballroom of the Sir Walter Hotel will be the scene of the Thursday evening and Friday morning meetings. The Friday evening meeting, when Mr. Agat speaks will be held in the Hugh Morson High School Auditorium. Mr. W. T. Couch of the University Press in Chapel Hill, who is president of the association, Mrs. Marian Sims, Charlotte novelist, and Mr. William T. Polk of Warrenton are among the other speakers.

The membership of the association is composed of those who are interested in literary and historical activities. The meetings are open and all interested students are urged to attend.

The Society for the Preservation of Antiquities, the State Art Society, and the Folk-Lore Society meet in Raleigh the same week. Dr. C. C. Crittenden, of the Literary and Historical Association, announces that this is the forty-first annual session of the organization.

### Library Acquires New Volumes

This year over a hundred new books have been added to the library. Many of these are reference books for the different departments, but among them are some of the newest fiction, travel and biography with which every girl will want to be acquainted. The following books will be found on the rental shelf: *Mountain Meadows*, by John Buchan, which is the story of a man who was given a year to live; *The Keys of the Kingdom*, the newest novel of A. J. Cronin; *Tory Oath*, by Tim Pridgen, a historical novel with its setting in Tidewater, N. C., during the American Revolution; *The Blind Man's House*, by Hugh Walpole, which tells of the twists and turnings of human character; *The Bright Pavilions*, by Hugh Walpole; *Junior Miss*, by Sally Benson; *They Came to a River*, by McKay; *Excuse It Please!* by Cornelia Skinner; are the new fiction books. *Lanterns on the Levee* is a biography by William Percy, the recollections of a planter's son. *The White Cliffs*, a book of poetry by Alice Miller, and *Berlin Diary* by Shirer are also found there.
