American Journal of International Law and contributor to various such journals.

For the subject of his address at the Southern IRC Conference Professor Eagleton has chosen "Forces Leading to Future International Organization."

Miss Jones is the Carnegie Endowment representative in charge of the International Relations Clubs, and will conduct the meetings. This she is especially qualified to do because of her contact with such clubs throughout the world. Miss Jones has lived in France and Germany and been a frequent visitor in Europe and is a well-known participant in international conferences. She has traveled widely in the Orient visiting International Relations Clubs for the Carnegie Endowment.

Miss Jones is a member of the American Political Science Association and of the American Society of International Law, as well as of the Conference of Teachers of International Law and Related Subjects and of its Committee on Adult Education and Public Relations.

There will be six round-table discussions which will run concurrently. There will be three sessions of each group, each session devoted to a different sub-topic. The following are the topics and suggested sub-topics:

4. *The Future Peace*, Group Chairman, Elizabeth Browlee. Realignment of National Boundaries, Colonial Possessions Economic Adjustments After the War Political World Organization
5. *Europe*, Group Chairman, Ruth Rautenstrauch. Russia and Germany Italy and the Balkans The Fate of France
6. *For What Do We Fight?* Group Chairman, Warren Coble. The Four Freedoms The Atlantic Charter Internationalism Dr. Eagleton will speak Friday night at 6:30 and square dancing and other entertainment will be held at 9:00 o'clock.
