Several games were played and then a picnic supper was served. After the supper, both groups discussed their work for the past year and their plans for the future.


Evelyn Hampton, president of the World Fellowship Group, had charge of devotional and dismissed the group with prayer.

### ORCHESTRA PROGRAMS


