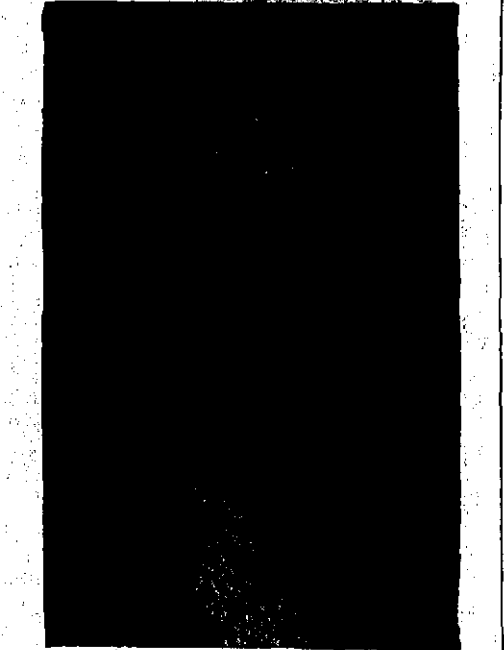


**MARRIES**
