March-April May Find **Construction Under Way**

According to authoritative sources, there is a possibility that work on the new buildings to be constructed on the Meredith College Campus as a part of the expansion program will begin next March or April. Tentative plans for building are already existent and actual blueprints and contracts are to be drawn up as soon as possible.

The amount of funds raised for the proposed expansion project total \$300,000 in cash receipts and \$100,000 more in pledges. The total cash receipts on hand are available to be put into building just as soon as building conditions and plans are ready.

It is thought that the first building to be constructed will be the new auditorium. This building will possibly include Music Department accommodations either on a separate floor or separated from the main auditorium by means of acoustics arrangements and air-condition-
