A week featuring a Voca-tional Interest Guidance program ended on the campus yesterday as the final series of discussion groups on various vocations was held. Under the direction of Mr. Dorsett, of the college education department, and with the assistance of Miss Pratt, fifteen different seminars on job opportunities were given

Beginning on Monday morn-ing, Mr. Lial Rogers, assistant director of student personnel at State College, was the key-note speaker for the week of vocational interests. Speaking on the general subject of choosing a vocation, Mr. Rogers outlined the steps best used by students to find the most suitable vocation.

Stressing unselfishness and service to others as the most opportunities as the best approach to making a decision about the vocation for a college graduate.

On Tuesday morning discussion groups were held on education, with Dr. J. Henry Highsmith in charge; on science jobs; on library work; on jobs in the field of art; and on radio and iournalism. led by Mrs. Jim Reid.
