Mr. Fon H. Scofield, Jr., is an associate secretary of the Foreign Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention in Richmond, Va. He has traveled widely to secure visual aids material, some of which has been shown at this college. Mr. Scofield's daughter, Ellen, is a sophomore at Meredith.

Dr. Winburn T. Thomas came in September from Indonesia to which he will return in the spring to serve as administrator of co-operative missions and to be associated with the Theological College in Djakarta. Dr. Thomas was the first executive secretary of the United Student Christian Council. He studied student relief needs in the universities of Europe in 1946-47. In Asia he has represented the World's Student Christian Federation by periods of service in Shanghai, Bangkok, Manila, and Allahabad.


