Hill, Jr. and Mr. Lonnie Kliever; informal seminars held each evening Monday through Thursday in the school parlors; class visitation led by members of the team; day-student seminars; an informal tea on Monday afternoon for the faculty, guests, and students; and a party for the faculty, guests, and students on Wednesday night.

Dr. John W. Eddins, Jr. is Assistant Professor of Theology at Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary. In the evening seminars, he led the discussions concerning "The Crisis of Contemporary Christianity."
