College Trustees Meet February 26

The Board of Trustees of Meredith College convened Tuesday, February 26, for the second meeting of the year with nineteen of the twenty-eight members present. The business before them consisted of reports by Dr. Sankie Blanton, Director of Public Relations, Howard Belcher, Secretary-Treasurer of the Board, and recommendations by Dr. Carlyle Campbell, college president.

Mr. Belcher reported that the college had recently received gifts from the First Baptist Church of Greensboro, the late Mrs. Charles Edward Brewer, and a grant from the Mary Reynolds Babcock Foundation. In addition, he stated that Meredith will share in the \$100,000 estate of T. F. Pettis to be administered by the North Carolina Baptist Foundation.

Recommendations to the Board, by Dr. Campbell, which were accepted were an increase in student fees of \$40 for tuition, \$10 for residence, and an increase in teachers' salaries of \$300 to \$400. The teachers' retirement program was also expanded by the removal of the \$6,000 ceiling. The professors will now receive retirement benefits based on their entire salaries, five per cent to (Continued on page 6)

Dr. Poteat was born in Kaifeng, Honan, China. After receiving his A.B. degree from Oberlin College and his B.D. degree from Yale University Divinity School, he was a fellow of the National Council on Religion in Higher Education and received his Ph.D. from Duke University. His scholastic achievements won him a Phi Beta Kappa mem-

For several years he was associate professor of Philosophy at the University of North Carolina. At the Episcopal Theological Seminary March 12 of the Southwest, he was professor of Philosophical Theology and Christian Criticism. He is now at Duke University as associate professor of Christianity and Culture.

Dr. Poteat's professional affiliations include the American Philosophical Association, the National Council on Religion in Higher Education, and the Southern Society of Philosophy and Psychology.
