Luncheon will be served in the college dining room prior to a meeting at 2:00 p.m. The afternoon session will include a discussion of career opportunities in the field of industry led by Westinghouse Electric Corporation and Kellogg Corporation. Southern Books Is Topic of Lecture

The annual Kappa Nu Sigma lecture will be given by Dr. Chalmers G. Davidson on March 27 at 8:00 p.m. Held in Jones Auditorium, the lecture will center in the topic "Great Books of the South."

Dr. Davidson, who was born in Chester, South Carolina, received an A.B. degree, summa cum laude, from Davidson College, M.A. degrees from Harvard and Chicago Universities, and his Ph.D. from Harvard University. He has been an educator of boys for many years, teaching at Chamberlain-Hunt Military Academy, Blue Ridge School for Boys, and The Citadel. Currently he is Professor of History at Davidson College and the director of Grey Memorial Library.

Heading the three main campus organizations will be Mary Lyon McKenney, president of S.G.A.; Nancy Evans, president of A.A.; and Carol Coxe, president of B.S.U.

McKenney, S. G. A. President

Mary Lyon, whose home is in Virginia Beach, has held several leadership positions on campus. She served as class president her sophomore year and as a hall proctor her junior year.
