Dr. Knight gathered material for this dissertation from the Oxford and Cambridge British Museum in England, Huntington Library in California, and from Helmingham Hall, where a private collection is kept. Of the fourteen manuscripts, twelve are in English and two are in Latin. Originally there were fifteen manuscripts, but one has been destroyed.

According to Dr. Knight, the chief interest of this sermon is its language and its medieval flavor rather than its content.
