In connection with the recent campus emphasis on popular music, with Mitch Ryder's appearance, the TWIG includes a study in the field of rock taken by *EYE* magazine.

The Beatles, Janis Joplin, Donovan, Jim Morrison and Jimi Hendrix were among the top winners in *EYE* Magazine's first annual *Rock 'n' Roll* Poll.

Divided into thirty categories from Best Album to Most Exciting New Face — the poll revealed that progressive rock, such as the Cream, is popular, but teeny bopper bubble gum rock, for example, the 1910 Fruitgum Company, is still in.

The Beatles walked off with three categories — Album of the Year, Best Group and Top English Group — and "Hey Jude" by the Beatles won the Best Single and Best Lyrics Award. The Top American Group was the Doors.

Flight arrangements have been made through the British Overseas Airways Corporation. For further information contact Charles Parker or Leonard White. The cost of the tour is \$795.00.

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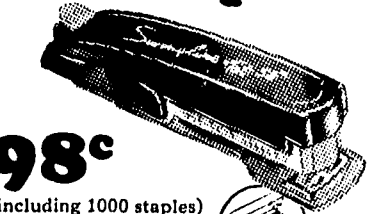


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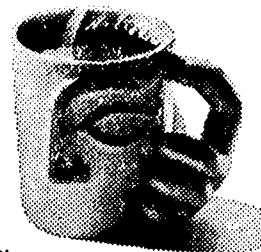


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
