SGA reports

(1) Dr. Weems has now approved the hair roller policy proposed last spring. Rollers can now be worn everynight in the cafeteria and during Saturday and Sunday breakfast. Rollers can also be worn in the library on Saturday afternoons.

(2) The two new proposals from leg board concerning freshman privileges were passed at the SGA convocation. One proposal changed the 6 weeks "lights out" for freshman to only a 2 week period. The other proposal changed the present

14 overnights for freshman to six overnights for the 1st 6 weeks of classes and then unlimited overnights for the remaining semester. These bills are now being presented before the Student Life Committee.

(3) SGA executive committee has appointed an ad-hoc committee to deal with the traffic problem on campus. This committee is now working with the Business Office in trying to establish new regulations and policies.

(4) Open House (male visitation) on Sundays from 2-5 is now being discussed in leg board and (hopefully) the bill will be presented in SGA on Friday the 21st.

(5) SGA's executive committee has set up a suggestion box in front of the calendar in the Student Center. Please make suggestions concerning all aspects of Meredith life. Genie Bailey will be answering question presented.
